Women disproportionately bear the burden of unpaid work and are more likely to be responsible for domestic labor.

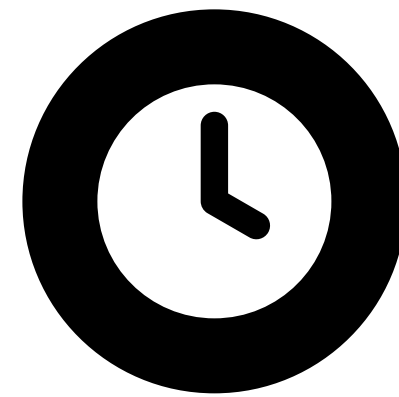
In Florida, many domestic workers—who are disproportionately migrants—do not earn a living wage, further restricting their access to the resources needed for personal and professional advancement.

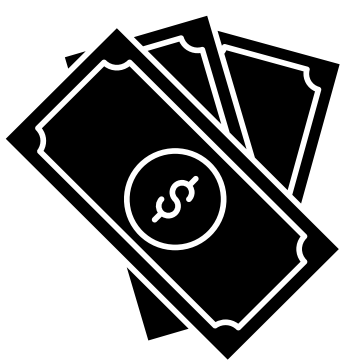


Non U.S. citizens, who make up roughly half of foreign-born non-citizens are among the most exploited in the domestic workforce because they lack labor rights or fear employer retaliation.

UNPAID

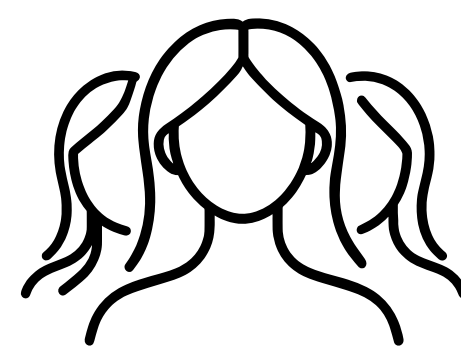


Immigrant women devote more time to unpaid non-market work than native-born women.



Florida Domestic workers are paid: less than their peers

47 %



First-generation women bear the burden of work as 37.72% are not in the labor force compared to 26.11% of second-generation women.
